A. Membership

The statutes of the IGU state that Commissions should consist of a Chair and Steering Group of ten members plus a Secretary. Given the size and complexity of the Commission on Geographical Education, the proposal accepted by the IGU Executive for the renewal of the Commission for the period 2020-2024, included a) joint chairs, and b) a concept of a steering committee of "10+" in order to recognise the on-going and significant role played by former Chairs and Steering Group members and c) the concept of Regional Contacts who are publicly identified with the role of facilitating effective communication and outreach between the CGE and specific regions of the world. As approved by the Executive Committee of the IGU in 2020, the effective Steering Group of the Commission may therefore be considered as a core of 11 people consisting of two co-chairs plus nine other members including the Secretary, supported by a panel of twelve long standing former Steering Group members and linked closely with 65 regional contacts who are asked to ensure that local information on research and developments in geographical education are reported to the Commission Secretary for inclusion in the CGE Newsletter and that information provided to the international community through the CGE Newsletters are disseminated through local and regional networks.

B. Meetings and programmes of work

The meetings organized by the Commission on Geographical Education 2020 - 2024 with information on their locations, dates, and numbers of participants.

The Commission on Geographical Education engages with its constituency through five forms of meetings:

- Special sessions arranged with local organisers as part of IGU Congresses and Regional meetings;
- 2. Symposia arranged by local organisers from within the Commission specific to the Commission;
- 3. Face to face meetings of the Steering Group (+10) to which all interested parties are invited to attend conducted at an appropriate time during or immediately before or after IGU Congresses or Conferences and Commission Symposia;
- 4. Virtual meetings conducted primarily for the Steering Group, Sub-committees of the Steering Group and Advisory Panel using various forms of internet collaborative software; and of particular note in the current reporting period;
- 5. Special meetings with other organisations and working parties for specific purposes.

IGU-CGE 2021 Conference, Prague, Czechia. Between August 10 to-13, 2021 the IGU CGE Conference 2021 was held in Prague, Czechia. The main conference theme was "Making connections: Cooperation and networking in geography education". The primary conference mission was to bring researchers and geography educators from all over the world to Prague to build and strengthen research networks and personal connections. Given the current pandemic situation, the conference was organized in a hybrid format – for the first time in the history of CGE. As a first keynote speaker, Michael Solem (Texas State University, USA) focused on the issue of "School geography, achievement, and education debts: What do we owe young people?" The second keynote speaker, Tine Béneker (Utrecht University, the Netherlands), gave a talk on "Connecting everyday knowledge to school knowledge and scholarly knowledge." Both keynote lectures were recorded. The recordings will be uploaded on the CGE website soon. Almost ninety delegates from Europe, Asia, Oceania, Africa, North America and Latin America attended the sessions. Approximately, thirty of them attended in person and fifty-five participated online using a virtual platform. This conference was jointly hosted by the Centre for Geographical and Environmental Education, the Faculty of Science, Charles University, and the Czech Geographical Society.

CGE Webinar 2021: Opportunities and Challenges for Geographical Education around the world during COVID and post COVID times. The Commission organized two webinars on the impact of the COVD-19 pandemic on geographical education around the world. While Part 1 includes examples from countries in Australia, Asia and Europe, Part 2 dealt with cases of North America and Africa. Each webinar includes a 5-10 minute talk by each panel member describing the issues in their respective countries and this is followed by a Q&A session. The two webinars were streamed live on the Commission's Facebook page and a total of 1350 people were reached for both webinars.

Steering Committee Meeting The average number of participants in a Steering group meeting was 7-10 and the number of participants in an open discussion session during a conference of congress was 15-50. The average number of meetings (in the categories 1-5 above) during a year was 4.

Progress on Programmes of Work established in 2020-2024

This programme of work also includes the main issues discussed during the meetings of the Commission. The Steering Committee of the Commission identified five areas of work for the period 2020-2024.

- 1. **Enhance the reputational capital of the CGE**. The 2020-2024 Commission will develop ways of ensuring that the visibility and accessibility of the commission are shared with a wider audience. The Commission will do this by building on the work of the 2016-2020 Commission and the established Regional Contacts and strengthen dissemination forms such as social networking and maintaining a even stronger digital presence. In 2021, the social media account on Facebook reached 2,803 people. Almost half of the people reached were through the two webinars organized by the commission.
- 2. **Grow the CGE network**. The 2016- 2020 Commission has greatly widened the reach and draw of the Commission and the IGU. The 2020 2024 Commission will seek to develop this network further. We will continue to work with early career researchers to enable them to join the current CGE network and we will continue to build on the network of Regional Contacts to spread the work of the Commission and disseminate its activities to a wider group. In 2021, the CGE network has reached 87 territories/countries.
- 3. **Raise the quality of geography education research**. The 2020 2024 Commission will seek to promote and enhance high quality geography education research. This will build on the work of the 2016 2020 Commission which published several books in a book series, and a valuable bibliography of important works in the field, and in the 2016 the International Charter on Geographical Education (the Charter). The 2020 2024 Commission will continue to encourage high quality research collaborations with existing research networks in the various regional networks in places like North America, East Asia and Southeast Asia, on themes as described in the Research agenda section of the Charter.
- 4. **Diversify the possible outlets for geography education research.** The Commission's flagship journal IRGEE, has steadily improved in metrics and the Commission is committed to support the sustained development of the Journal. In addition, the Commission has supported a range of other publications, notably the Springer Book Series. The 2020 -2024 Commission will seek to diversify the range and opportunities for the publication and dissemination of geography education research, including exploring opportunities for Open Access, as well as more through the Commission Book Series. In 2021, IRGEE has improved in its impact metrics and 2 new books were published through the Commission Book Series (see details in publications section below).
- 5. **Strengthen research to practice applications.** There is an increasing diversification of research applicable to geography education. The 2020 -2024 Commission will seek to support the teaching of geography around the globe, through developing researcher-practitioner partnerships, stronger links with local and regional professional associations, working with researchers to consider contextual issues

that may affect applicability to practice, and encouraging the wider dissemination of practitioner research through the international community. A series of workshops for early career academics has been planned for 2022.

Additional Projects of the Commission in 2021

1. **Wikipedia pages about geography education**: Commission decided that there was not enough information on geography education provided through the Wikipedia page (see https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Category:Geography_education), so a group of scholars started the Wikipedia page update project in 2021. With the approval of and support from the IGU-CGE Steering Committee, Joop van der Schee, Nina Scholten, and Susan Caldis have been working on the project.

C. Networking

Means by which your commission has collaborated with other IGU Commissions and Task Forces

- 1. Collaboration with iGeo Task Force to help the local organizers prepare the 2021 International Geography Olympiad (iGeo) in Istanbul, Turkey. Especially, a number of the Commission members participated in the iGeo as national team leaders which was held on August 11-15 at Istanbul Technical University.
- 2. Continued Support to the Society for Environmental Map Education through the 31st Asahikawa Children's Environmental Map Contest in October 2021. The Commission supported the event through the IGU-CGE Awards for Environmental Map Education, for children who win the contest (http://www.environmentalmap.org).

1. The Commission continues to publish *International Research in Geographical and Environmental Education (IRGEE)* through Taylor and Francis. ISSN: 1038-2046


IRGEE is published four times a year and serves four major purposes:

- a. to promote an expanded international interest in research in geographical and environmental education:
- b. to provide a forum for the critique of research studies and the discussion of relevant research issues in geographical and environmental education;
- c. to encourage the international dissemination of research in geographical and environmental education; and
- d. to demonstrate the relevance of research studies to good professional practice in geographical and environmental education.

The flagship journal of the commission continues to grow in its impact. IRGEE has improved in all its metrics. Full paper download has increased and IRGEE has been ranked Q1 in Education and Q2 in Geography journals. The journal's Cite score has also increased from 2.3 in 2019 to 3.1 in 2020 with an accompanying h-index at 28 for 2020. Indices for 2021 will only be available in 2022.
